PROTECTING OUR COMMUNITY

It has been a great experience working with our police force over the past eight years. The department has grown from a small two-person operation providing part-time protection to a full-time force supplying 24/7 coverage to our area. I have been able to “peek” behind the badge and get to know each officer personally. Aside from being great officers they are great men with families and feelings. Sometimes we look at police officers as tough no-nonsense supermen, but I have had the privilege to see the other side of their lives.

The world has become a lot crazier as we have all witnessed over the past few months. Unfortunately, Springdale isn't isolated from it or able to escape it. The big public happenings are well documented and talked about; however, it's the myriad of “little” things that go mostly unnoticed that help keep us safe every day. “Live up to their legacy”

Each year, millions of Americans come together to REMEMBER the fallen, HONOR those that serve and their families, and TEACH the next generation about the value of freedom during *Wreaths Across America Day*. This gathering of volunteers and patriots takes place in local, state and national cemeteries in all 50 states – including our own Jolley-Gifford Cemetery here in Springdale. Each year the organization selects a theme to help focus their message and outreach to communities. The theme for 2021 is “Live up to their legacy”. The inspiration for this year's theme came from a statement made by United States Army Chief of Staff, General James C. McConville, who said “*We stand on the shoulders of heroes that have gone before us, and really what we strive to do is live up to their legacy.*”

In 2020, approximately 1.7 million veterans' wreaths were placed by volunteers on headstones at 2,557 participating locations around the county (including Springdale and Rockville) in honor of the service and sacrifices made for our freedom. This year, more than 2,700 participating cemeteries are registered including Arlington National Cemetery.



This year, National Wreaths Across America Day is Saturday, December 18, 2021 starting at 10:00am. Please join us at the Jolley-Gifford Cemetery for this very special event. Come watch the Pineview ROTC Color Guard raise the colors, listen to inspirational stories and a keynote speech from Sergeant First Class JJ Allred, read Springdale Elementary essays, and help us lay wreaths on our veteran gravesites to commemorate their service to our country. Wreaths Across American volunteers work year-round to ensure military laid to rest are remembered, their families and living veterans honored, and the next generation is taught about the value of freedom.

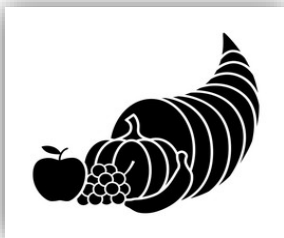




From the Chief

October Trail Project: Nung'wu Poa

On October 9th, members of the community gathered to construct a trail on the Paiute property located across the river from the George A. Barker River Park. The team was able to complete a loop with a length of half a mile, sitting atop a plateau with scenic views of Springdale and Zion Canyon. The trail connects to an adjacent loop, also a half mile, that was constructed some months ago.

The trail was named by the Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah as Nung'wu Poa, which translates to "Paiute Trail" in the Paiute language.



The best way for a new trail to become established is through use, and we encourage all to go up and check the trail out for yourselves. While doing so, please use proper trail etiquette by staying on the path (no social trails) and leaving no trace.

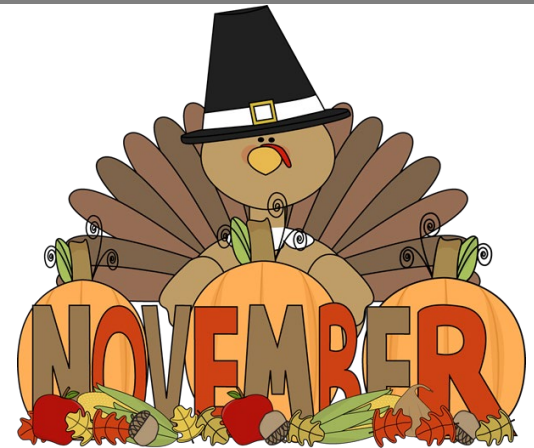

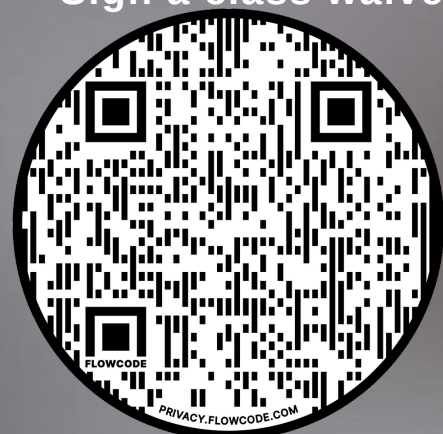

VISITATION TO ZION NATIONAL PARK IS INCREASING RAPIDLY, WITH TOURISTS BRINGING NEW PRESSURES TO NATIVE WILDLIFE LIKE TRASH, VEHICLE TRAFFIC, AND DOMESTIC ANIMALS. WHAT ARE THE HEALTH CONSEQUENCES OF THIS EXTREME HUMAN ACTIVITY TO SPRINGDALE'S LOCAL FAUNA?

ANNA STUDIES ROCK SQUIRRELS AND RINGTAILS IN HABITATS THAT VARY IN HUMAN-USE THROUGH BEHAVIORAL SURVEYS AND BIOLOGICAL SAMPLE COLLECTION. EQUIPPED WITH THIS DIVERSE FIELD DATA, SHE AIMS TO UNDERSTAND HOW PARK VISITORS MODIFY ANIMAL BEHAVIOR AND COMMUNITIES, WITH RESULTING CHANGES TO PARASITE TRANSMISSION PATHWAYS AND INFECTION PATTERNS.
