Springdale to be Nominated as an International Dark-Sky Community

For the past 12 years, the Town has been taking steps to preserve the quality of the dark night skies in Springdale.

The Town has adopted standards for outdoor lighting at residences and businesses. In conjunction with the SR9 reconstruction, the Town installed new night sky-friendly streetlights. The Town later made custom retrofits to those streetlights to better control the light and protect the night sky. The Town has arranged and sponsored a series of night sky lectures, telescope star parties, and other educational events to help promote awareness of the importance of dark night skies. The Town has partnered with Zion National Park on their dark sky preservation efforts and supported their nomination as a Dark-Sky Park.

All of these efforts have helped preserve the dark night sky in the Town. Dark night skies improve the quality of life for residents, have economic benefits for businesses, and promote better health for both people and wildlife. Springdale continues to enjoy dark night skies and clear views of the stars because of our community's commitment.



As a result of these efforts, the Town is qualified to apply for an International Dark-Sky Community designation. The Town will submit a nomination application to the International Dark-Sky Association later this month. If successful, the Town will become just the third Dark-Sky Community in Utah. We will keep you updated on progress as the nomination is processed. In the meantime, thank you to all the residents and businesses who have supported and continue to support the Town's efforts to preserve the dark night sky.

Now is an excellent time to re-examine the outdoor lighting at your house or business to make sure it is dark sky friendly and helps preserve this important resource. Please contact the Town's Planning Department if you have any questions about dark sky lighting requirements or how you can help with the dark sky nomination process.

You'll have a chance to meet representatives from Family Healthcare. The CEO, Lori Wright, is willing to open a primary health care medical clinic and pharmacy in Springdale. They were the group that provided the Covid and flu vaccination clinic at the Canyon Community Center on December 3. Family Healthcare operates clinics in St. George, Hurricane, and Cedar City -- offering integrated medical, behavioral, and dental care, with a sliding scale fee structure that ensures everyone has access to high-quality affordable care. They also offer deeply discounted prescription medications. We're working on finding a suitable location for them in Springdale, and you can expect to hear more about that soon. Mike and Helen McMahan have been affiliated with this group for many years and have confidence that they will serve the people of Springdale well for years to come.

I'm planning to schedule a quarterly *"Bring Your Own Lunch (BYOL) with the mayor"* to hear what's on your minds, but meanwhile, I'm always willing to have a telephone conversation, e-mail exchange, or visit with you.



Mosquito Abatement District News

The Southwest Mosquito Abatement District provided their year-end statistics for Washington County. In 2021, 38,000 (plus) mosquitos were trapped and tested, none of which carried West Nile virus, St. Louis encephalitis, or Zeka virus. This is the second year in a row for the county that these viruses in mosquitos were not found.

Unfortunately, northern Utah did not fare as well - viruses were found, a number of humans infected, and there were several deaths. The District attributes Washington County's lack of infections to the scarcity of birds due to the drought. Birds are the primary source of these infections and mosquitoes feed on the birds and then transmit viruses to other animals and humans.



Remember that all property owners in Washington County pay to support Southwest Mosquito Abatement by a line item on your property tax bill. If you see mosquitoes, you should call so that they can come and determine the breeding source, and eliminate both the source and the mosquitoes. Their phone number is 435-627-0076.

History & Visitor Center Update

We are happy to report that there are some new and exciting developments with the Springdale History and Visitor Center!

As you may have noticed, the old Canyon Ranch Home has been razed and we are now starting with a blank slate for the community's history center. The Town has been working with the architects and the contractor to design a new building that not only conforms with the Town Code but can be designed specifically to meet the needs of the community. As the design phase moves along, Town staff and community stakeholders will be relied upon heavily to provide input and help with the process. Another piece of good news is that the Town was awarded \$94,400 from the State to help with the construction costs, thanks to a grant request put together by Darci Carlson.

We are very excited at the progress that has been made with this project, and continue to look forward to building an incredible facility the community will be able to enjoy and be proud of.


From the Chief

Changes to Lion Blvd. Garbage and Recycling Coming Soon

For several years, the Town has provided a trash dumpster and two recycling bins on Lion Blvd. for the convenience of the residential community. Unfortunately, due to misuse of the dumpsters and illegal dumping on the property, the Town will be removing these dumpsters and recycling bins in the near future.

Illegal dumping has been an ongoing issue. Posted signs, appeals to the community, or enforcement have not been able to correct these issues. While the Police Department is often able to find and cite those that create the problem, the time involved in investigating and responding is substantial and uses resources that could be put to other priorities. Some of the more challenging problems include:



Additionally, the trash bins are consistently overfilled, which increases dumping costs and allows trash to be blown or carried by the wind. Again, time and resources are expended that could be put toward other municipal needs.

As of March 1, 2022, the Lion Blvd. trash dumpster, cardboard recycling bin, and mixed-materials recycling bin will be removed. The binnies will be retained, but if problems, illegal activities, or misuse continues, they could also be removed in the future. The Town's intent is to give residents sufficient time to make changes if they need to. For instance, if you are presently not a BluCan subscriber and have been using the recycling bins (not the binnies), you may want to consider signing up for the BluCan curbside recycling service or sort your recycling and use the binnies. Please contact Kyndal Sagers at Town Hall to sign up for the BluCan service.

There are a number of options if you have large or bulky trash items to dispose of. These include:

- Requesting a bulky item pick up from Republic Services. Just call 435-628-2821 to schedule a pickup.
- Using the quarterly 'dumpster days' dumpsters. The District provides each community with large 30-yard roll-off dumpsters four times per year. The 2022 schedule for these will be made available later in January.
- Using the Virgin waste transfer station. The transfer station is open most days and will accept household trash, recycling, tire recycling, appliances, and bulky items. It is located on Kolob Terrace Road near the intersection of SR9.
