HERE'S TO OUR HEALTH

On August 16, Helen McMahan and I had the honor of attending a ribbon cutting and open house event at the new Family Healthcare Riverside Drive Clinic in St. George. Family Healthcare is the provider that is willing to open an integrated clinic (family medicine, urgent care, behavioral health and onsite discount pharmacy) in Springdale if they can secure a suitable location.

I thought I'd share a little background on how we got here. As a member of the Planning Commission working on our updated General Plan, I interviewed Mike and Helen McMahan in late 2020. When their clinic was flooded on June 29, 2021, the initial verdict was that the clinic could not be restored. I knew how devastating it would be to Mike and Helen and the community if we lost our clinic, so I started making calls to property owners throughout Town to see if they could "host" the clinic.

Meanwhile, Helen received a call from Lori Wright, the CEO of Family Healthcare. Helen was a former employee of that organization, and Lori wanted to know how she could help. Helen's response was that they could open a clinic in the Town of Springdale. Lori took this request to heart, and she obtained approval from her Board of Directors to proceed. Family Healthcare's preference was that the clinic be located on SR-9, so that made our search more difficult. One business





Temporary Binnies Location

Starting September 1st, the dirt lot where the binnies are located will become a staging area for the contractor of the Blacks Wash reconstruction project. Because of that, the binnies will be temporarily removed from this area for safety reasons and unavailable to the public. Rockville is welcoming Springdale residents to use their binnies during this time. The Rockville binnies are located on Center Street. Please deposit your recycling only between the hours of 9 am-5 pm Monday through Saturday to not disturb neighbors. You can also bring your recycled materials to the Virgin Waste Transfer Station located on Kolob Terrace Road, or to La Verkin near Wanless Park on State Street.

The Springdale binnies will be returned to the dirt lot sometime in early January 2023 or once the reconstruction work is completed.

Bike Ambassadors to the Rescue!

The ZNP/Springdale Bike Ambassador Program is a coordinated volunteer effort between Zion National Park and the Town of Springdale to improve bicycle and pedestrian safety in Town and in the Park. The primary focus areas are the Town sidewalks and the Pa'rus in ZNP.

In an effort to encourage bike riders to use the bike lanes, all of the bike rental businesses in Springdale are now informing their renters that they must use the bike lanes. Also, a new bike lane has been painted in the Zion Canyon Village directing bicycles to use the right (easternmost) exit of the parking lot when returning to Town. Additional signage and a crosswalk are planned to allow pedestrians and cyclists to cross Zion Canyon Boulevard and return to Town in the bike lane on the north side of the street.

In ZNP, the Pa'rus will be soon installing 15 MPH signs. Also, most of the bike rental businesses are now only renting Class 1 E-bikes which means that a rider must peddle the bike in order to obtain motor assistance. For many cyclists, this has the effect of slowing E-bikes to 15 MPH.

Nine bike ambassador volunteers have been trained and deployed in ZNP to assist bike riders and pedestrians with directions, reminders of the biking rules and minor first aid. The bike ambassadors also carry radios in order to report emergencies, accidents, or something as simple as a flat tire. When you see a bike ambassador, please thank them for their service. We are all just trying to make your time in Springdale and ZNP a safer and more pleasant experience.

Springdale Parks: Sprinkler Care During Monsoon Season

With all the rain we have received the irrigation system has been extra dirty. This can wreak havoc on all sprinkler systems. The Parks Department always makes it a priority to run a system check for clogged nozzles. One thing that helps prevent clogging is to remove all filters from the sprinkler head itself. All sprinklers have built-in filters that are removable. Another practice we have for unclogging our system is to remove the lowest point sprinkler head and irrigate the system with any debris and heavy mud. This can usually prevent the nozzles from becoming clogged. The last thing we do is watch for plugged sprinkler valves. When this happens, the zone with the plugged valve will not fully shut off on its own. This can prevent other zones from running at full pressure or at all. It will also keep the valve open so the sprinklers in that zone continue to run. This can be fixed by replacing the inside of the valve. Sometimes it just needs to be manually shut off and that can remedy the issue as well. The Parks Department is always happy to answer any questions you may have.





Materials Recycling Program

Members of the Washington County Solid Waste Board, Jean Krause, Virgin, Dannielle Larkin, St. George, Ron Cundick, Leeds, and Suzanne Elger, Springdale, toured the MRF (Materials Recycling Facility) operated by Republic Waste Services located in Las Vegas. All of Washington county's blue can and binnie materials are taken to the landfill in Washington City where they are transferred into tractor trailers for transport to the MRF where they are processed.

The process is a highly automated and mechanized system of conveyors, sorters, and sifters. Technology such as laser optical sorters and air nozzles, eddy currents, and magnets are used to sort and separate the recyclables. Once the materials are sorted, they are compacted into bales. The bales are then sent out to various facilities for final recycling. Glass is handled separately. It is crushed and sorted into two different sizes and goes for further processing.

Each recyclable material, cardboard, paper, glass, metal, aluminum, and plastic, is sent to a processor/end-user that needs that material at that time. Aluminum is the material with the highest demand for recycling.

Staffing is needed to do fine sorting and maintain the equipment. The employees use tablets to maintain the computerized system. Staff also perform visual quality control checks on the bales to ensure that the bales are clean and free of other materials.

The facility processes 2 million pounds per day of recyclables. The contamination rate (recyclables that cannot be processed and are sent to the landfill) ranges from 30-40% for the MRF as a whole. However, Washington County's rate is much lower at 20-25% which means that 75-80% of our materials sent for recycling are recycled. The more intact a recyclable material is, the easier it is to process through the various sorting lines.

The biggest contaminant in the process is what is called flexible plastic packaging. It gets caught and tangled in the equipment. Just exactly what is flexible plastic packaging? Some examples are plastic grocery bags, plastic produce bags, wrappers around cases of soda, water, toilet paper, air-filled bags, and bubble wrap. Flexible plastic packaging can be taken to grocery stores that collect it for recycling. One manufacturer uses this plastic to make decking material.

Here are some simple guidelines to follow for effective recycling.

1. Recycle paper, flattened cardboard, metal, aluminum, glass, and plastics marked with 1,2 and 5
2. Put your recyclables in your blue can or binnies empty, clean and dry
3. Caps on plastics containers are acceptable
4. Don't bag your recyclables

Here are some materials that cannot be recycled.

1. Styrofoam
2. Flexible plastic packaging
3. Rigid plastic containers such as totes
4. Waxed paper and coated paper for food products





Pesticides Fact Sheet

What Are The Potential Hazards?

Pesticides applied to plants during crop, lawn, and garden maintenance may leach into the ground water and cause contamination. Proper storage, mixing, application, spill cleanup, watering, and disposal procedures should be included in pesticide best management practices.

Storing Pesticides

The fewer pesticides you buy, the fewer you will have to store. Therefore, only purchase the amount and kind of pesticide that is needed. Pesticides should always be stored in sound, properly labeled, original containers. **Sound containers are the first defense against spills and leaks.**

- Ensure that there are no holes, tears, or weak seams in the containers and that the label is readable.
- Pesticides should be stored in locked, dry cabinets.
- Be sure to store dry products above liquids to prevent wetting from spills.
- Storage and mixing areas should not be located near floor drains of any kind.
- Storage facilities should have secondary containment, such as a berm or dike, which will hold spills or leaks at:
 - 10% of the total volume of the containers, or
 - 110% of the volume of the largest container, whichever is larger.

Mixing Pesticides

- Mix pesticides on an impermeable surface, such as concrete, so any spills will be contained.
- Mix only the amount that you will use:
 - Measure the total square feet you intend to treat.
 - Read the label on the pesticide container and follow the instructions. (These are often given in terms of amount of pesticide to use per thousand square feet.)
 - By properly measuring and calculating, there should be little or no pesticide left in the spray tank when the job is finished and it will be applied at the recommended rate.

Applying Pesticides

Pesticides are used to kill or control weeds (herbicides), insects (insecticides) and fungi (fungicides) that attack plants. Some of these pesticides can move through the soil and into the ground water. Guidelines for the safe use of pesticides are listed below:

- Be willing to accept a low level of weed, insect, and plant disease infestation.
- Use pesticides only when absolutely necessary.
- Identify pests correctly. Use the proper pesticides.
- Read and follow the directions printed on the container labels. Remember, the label is the law.

- Calibrate your spreader and sprayer to keep from applying too much pesticide.
- Do not spray or apply pesticides near irrigation wells. Wells are conduits to the ground water.
- Do not spray or apply pesticides near your walks and driveway. This prevents them from washing off into the storm drain system.

Cleaning Up Spills

- Dry formulated pesticide spills should be swept up and applied to crops, lawns, and gardens at the rate specified on the label.
- Liquid pesticide spills should be soaked up using absorbent material (such as, soil, sawdust, and cat litter). The contaminated absorbent material should then be put in a sealed container and taken to a household hazardous waste collection site.

Watering

Over-watering your plants can cause excess water to move through the soil. This water can carry pesticides that can contaminate the ground water. The best way to avoid over-watering is simply to measure how much you are adding. Contact your county Extension Service to determine the best way to calculate how much water your plants need and how to measure the amount you are applying.

Disposing of Pesticides

If the pesticide was properly measured and mixed, there should be little or no spray left in the tank. The little that may be left can be safely sprayed over the area that was treated until it is gone. Disposal of empty pesticide containers and unused pesticides should be handled as follows:

- If you are using liquid pesticides, rinse the container three times. Be sure to pour the rinsing into your sprayer and not down a drain or onto the ground. Containers, which have been emptied and rinsed, can be discarded in the trash.
- Unused pesticides in their original containers can be recycled at household hazardous waste collection sites.
