Fiber Project

You may know that the Springdale Town Council approved a financial match in the amount of \$113,650 to support a town-wide fiber broadband project by South Central Communications (SCC). The plan is to bring fiber consistently throughout the Town limits, making it available to every residence that wishes to have it. The exception is the Anasazi Plateau, which obtained fiber several years ago. During the build out of this project, residents will not be charged an installation fee but will pay the monthly rate for the service once the fiber is installed and activated. Connections made after this build out project may incur installation fees in addition to the monthly service fee.

The Town also agreed to provide a 50' x 50' piece of property for a building to house SCC's infrastructure. We have identified a site on Town property directly west of the Redhawk Subdivision, near the power substation, that will be suitable for their needs. SCC is in the process of developing plans for the site. The site will have a small (10' x 20') networking building, propane tank, and backup generator and will be fenced to control access.

The other ongoing work is negotiating a memorandum of understanding and site lease agreement between SCC and the Town. Initial drafts of these documents have been reviewed and will be finalized once the site development plans are complete and ready for approval by the Town.

Did You Know: The Importance of Street Sweeping in Springdale

Springdale's streets may look clean and pristine, but the work behind the scenes to maintain them is often overlooked. One crucial aspect of this maintenance is street sweeping, a significant task in keeping the town's roads and Zion Park Blvd. clear and safe for all residents and visitors.

In Springdale, street sweeping is not just a quick drive down the road with a sweeper vacuum and curb brooms. It is a process that requires time, effort, and resources. For instance, weekly sweeping Zion Park Blvd. and town-owned streets take roughly 16 hours and 54 miles driven at 10 miles an hour. This attention to detail ensures that debris, leaves, and other potential hazards are removed promptly, enhancing the overall road safety in the town.

The importance of street sweeping goes beyond just aesthetics. By regularly sweeping the streets, the town can prevent debris buildup that can clog storm drains and lead to flooding during heavy rains. Additionally, removing debris helps remove potential contaminants that could travel to the Virgin River and extend the road's life, reducing the need for costly repairs and maintenance in the long run.

Regarding cost-effectiveness, street sweeping is crucial in keeping maintenance costs low. By staying proactive, the town can save money on repairs that may be needed if sweeping is neglected. Furthermore, clean streets contribute to a positive image of the town, enhancing its appeal to residents and tourists alike.

It is that time of year again, and Scotch thistle is currently in full bloom.

Please examine your property and remove all Scotch thistle. Periodically inspect the property and remove new growth as necessary. Removing Scotch prior to their seeding and seed dispersal will greatly reduce or eliminate this annual noxious weed issue.

Remember, it's the Code, and more importantly, it is the Rule.... The Golden Rule.

Issues: Scotch thistle (*Onopordum acanthium*) is a problem in open areas like rangelands because it can reduce forage production and prevent livestock from accessing water. Scotch thistle can also form impenetrable thickets that block access to trails and stream banks, and can prevent animals from grazing land.

Scotch thistle is a biennial plant that's native to Europe and Asia. It has large purple flowers that bloom in May and June and leaves that run up the sides of the stems, making it look like wings. Scotch thistle can take nutrients and water from grasses that large animals eat, and its dense stands compete with native plants for resources.

Scotch thistle can produce up to 40,000 seeds, and the seeds remain viable in the soil for many years. The roots of the scotch thistle plant can grow deep, sometimes over a foot, and then send up new shoots every few inches. The older the plant gets, the deeper and farther its roots go. To minimize the harmful impact on bees and other pollinators, you can treat plants before they bloom. If treatment is necessary after blooming, you can control the plant early in the morning or in the evening when bees are less active. 
Help Wanted: Be a Part of Protecting the Dark Night Sky

After the planning work is done and signed off and the agreement is approved by Town Council and SCC, they'll be able to get started on the installation work. SCC is hoping to have the site development done and installed by late summer (August / September) and ready for the line installation work. Realistically, given their workload, line installation will probably be a late fall/winter project. SCC doesn't think it will be a long process once they can start moving. Construction will utilize public roads where feasible and will use a combination of existing conduits and micro-trenching. For properties not fronting on public streets, SCC's team that manages easements and rights-of-way will be contacting property owners for access.

Thanks for your patience. While this project has taken a little longer than hoped, the benefits of town-wide fiber will be worth getting things done right. Stay tuned for updates as the project moves forward.
