## It's July!

July is here! July is, on average, the warmest month of the year in the northern hemisphere. In the southern hemisphere, July is, on average, the coldest month of the year and is the second month of winter. The "dog days of summer" officially begin on July 3. Historically, they were associated with bad luck, mad dog attacks, unexpected thunderstorms, heat, and drought.

July was named after Julius Caesar by the Roman senate. Prior to that time, it was called Quintilis (Latin for fifth) and was the fifth month of the 10-month-long ancient Roman calendar. Julius Caesar wasn't the only military genius born in July. Alexander the Great was also born in July, as were Frida Kahlo, Franz Kafka, Marcel Proust, and Nelson Mandela.

July 2 is World UFO Day, July 3 is Stay out of the Sun Day (and my birthday), July 4 is Independence Day, July 6 is National Fried Chicken Day, and July 29 is International Tiger Day. Month-long observations include National Watermelon Month, National Hot Dog Month, and National Ice Cream Month.

July has two birth flowers -- the water lily and the larkspur. The water lily is a symbol of a pure heart, and the larkspur represents the lightness of the heart. The birthstone of July is the ruby, considered by many to be the king of gems and believed to protect against evil.

The first crewed mission to the Moon, the Apollo 11 Mission, launched on July 16, 1969. Four days later, Neil Armstrong took the first step on the Moon while declaring "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind!"

Finally, the first atomic bomb was detonated on July 16, 1945, in Alamogordo, New Mexico. The bomb was called "Fat Boy," and the mushroom cloud was 41,000 feet high.

On June 6, the Town sponsored a Community Blackout Night. All the lights on Lion Boulevard near the Canyon Community Center and Town hall were turned off, allowing the natural dark to cover the area. Volunteers from the St. George Astronomy Group, Southern Utah University, Utah Tech University, Stargazing Zion, and Zion National Park set up a total of 25 telescopes on the Town ballfield, providing participants views of stars, nebulae, galaxies, and other celestial objects. ## Wanted: Dedicated Community Workforce Members in Need of Housing

For the past year and a half the Town has been working on a plan to make workforce housing options available to the community. We have partnered with Mountain Country Home Solutions on a project that will make seven single family homes and up to ten multi-family rentals available to families who are part of Springdale's workforce.

We are happy to announce we will soon be ready to select potential buyers for the first two of the single family homes! These two homes are located in the Red Hawk subdivision, conveniently situated in the center of Town. They are approximately 1,800 square feet and were constructed in 2009.

The homes will be part of a community land trust. This means the homebuyer will purchase the home itself and will enter into a long-term lease on the underlying property. This greatly reduces the sales price of the home and keeps the homes affordable for Springdale's working families.

Mountain Country Home Solutions hopes to have the homes sold and families occupying the homes by the end of August! If you are interested in purchasing the homes please contact Thomas Dansie ([tdansie@springdale.utah.gov](mailto:tdansie@springdale.utah.gov)) to get your name on the list of interested buyers.

Homebuyers must have household income between 80 and 125% of the Washington County Area Median Income. In addition to income qualification, homebuyers will be selected based on the length and type of their employment and service in Springdale and Zion National Park. Preference is given to households who have worked here longer, and to those that work in an essential service (public safety, healthcare, public education, etc.).

All potential buyers will need to be pre-approved for a mortgage before being eligible to be considered for the homes. Mountain Country Home Solutions' preferred Loan Officer who will be handling the land trust transactions is Natalie Drake. She is available to help interested buyers get started on the pre-approval process and can be reached at 432-632-1900.

While there will only be two single family homes available at this time, we are optimistic that the additional five homes will be ready to purchase in about a year. The multi-family rental units will be available in about eighteen months. So if you are not selected for one of the first two homes there will be more options coming soon!

## Meet the Springdale Parks and Rec Team

As the Springdale Parks and Recreation Department, it is our goal and our mission "to enhance the quality of life for residents and visitors of Springdale by providing safe, pristine parks and facilities, welcoming and accessible programming, meaningful leisure opportunities and exceptional Town events." With our recent designation as a Healthy Utah Community, we are also focusing on different ways in which we can promote health and wellness (both physical and mental) within the community. So how do we do this? We take care of your parks, trails and cemetery grounds. We hold regular programming at the Canyon Community Center, including art workshops, yoga, high fitness and more. We plan and organize both large-scale and small-scale events, such as the Butch Cassidy 10k/5k, the Zion Chalk and Earth Fest, outdoor movies, and much more. Last, we look for ways to engage with community members to get a feel for what the recreational needs and wants are for residents.

## Meals on Heels Walking Tour A Runaway Success!

The most recent installment of the Town's "Two Cent" Community Engagement series, *Meals on Heels*, was a big success. On the morning of May 30 a committed group of community members joined Community Development staff for a walk through the Town. The group started the walk at the site of the Town's future downtown plaza and ended at the River Park. Along the way we talked about current community development projects, Town priorities, and resident concerns. Thanks to everyone who came and participated!

As we have done following our previous Two Cent events, we are providing a list of the comments we received coupled with the Town's plans to address these comments. Resident Comment	Town Action
Community members are excited for the new downtown plaza. When will it be complete?	The Town has selected Caliber Contractor to construct the plaza. We are finalizing the contract with Caliber. After that we will spend about two to three months finalizing plans. Caliber will then begin construction, which is estimated to take twelve to fourteen weeks. Based on this timeline we are hoping to have the plaza complete in early 2025.
How can residents get more information about development projects that are reviewed at the staff level and don't go to the Planning Commission or Town Council?	We are investigating ways to provide more information to the community on this topic. One suggestion is to include a list of staff approved development projects with each Planning Commission agenda item. We are investigating how we can make this work.
The crosswalk at SR9 and Winderland Lane continues to be problematic. What can be done to improve visibility and safety at this location? Similar concerns regarding the crosswalk at Canyon Springs Drive.	The Streets Department is continuing to experiment with pavement markings and other advance warning messaging to help alert drivers of the crosswalk. Recent changes like the orange pedestrian flags have made a noticeable difference and we are working on more solutions.
Commercial traffic on Big Springs Road is creating negative impacts on residents who live on the road.	The Town staff has met with residents on Big Springs to talk about potential strategies.
Scotch Broom is a popular plant for Springdale landscapes. Unfortunately, it is also mildly invasive. It should be prohibited.	The Town's approved plant list can be updated to reflect this change. Town staff will make this suggestion to the Planning Commission for their consideration.
Property owners whose landscape overhangs the public right-of-way and sidewalks have the obligation to trim vegetation to make sure sidewalks are clear. The Town should remind property owners of this responsibility.	This is a great suggestion. Town staff will investigate where vegetation needs to be cut back and remind property owners to trim the offending plants.
Trash cans and recycling bins should be placed on the sidewalk on pick-up days, not in the bike lane.	This is another great suggestion. Town staff will send a community notice to remind residents to put their trash and recycling on the sidewalk for pick-up.
Residents loved the shade trees planted with the new sidewalk project south of the LaFave rentals. The Town should encourage more street shade trees.	Thank you for the great feedback! We are happy that we have been able to include shade trees in many of the recent sidewalk projects (Lion Blvd, SR9, etc.). We will continue to look for opportunities to enhance the streetscape with shade trees, as suggested in the Town's streetscape plan.
Trace pharmaceuticals are present in the Virgin River (as a result of narrows hikers in Zion). The Town should explore ways to remove them from our drinking water.	The Town's new water treatment plant is state of the art and produces excellent quality water. The Town routinely tests drinking water to ensure it meets all State and Federal standards. A copy of the most recent water quality report is available on the Town's website. Unfortunately, we are unable to either test or treat water for trace pharmaceuticals at this time. While the Town is confident our water meets and exceeds all water quality and safety standards, residents who are concerned about trace pharmaceuticals may wish to consider alternative sources for drinking water (e.g. bottled water) or supplemental treatment at their residence (e.g. reverse osmosis).
Residents are excited about the Town's plans to continue removal of invasive species (Russian olive and tamarisk) from the Virgin River and its tributaries. Residents are hopeful invasive species removal efforts can be extended to other areas of the Town.	The Town has applied for a grant that would fund a three year project to remove invasive species from the riparian areas and tributary washes in the Town. We are expecting to hear whether or not this grant is funded in the next month. If funded, the Town will begin a three project to remove these invasive species from the community.

## Emergency and Non-emergency Communication Channels

Following the recent fire in Rockville the Town received several calls and questions about emergency and community notifications. There are several methods to receive alerts and information during emergencies and even under more mundane conditions. These methods include the county-wide reverse 911 system, the Town website alerts, community email blasts, and social media. The reverse 911 system provides the most current and immediate information during an emergency. The other methods are updated regularly based on their purpose and content but are not routinely updated during an emergency.

We encourage you to make sure you are set up to receive information from all these communication channels. For each of these channels to be successful, the person wishing to receive information has to do something: sign up, select, request, or follow. The Town provides a significant amount of information, and we want to help you put yourself in a position to receive it.

### Reverse 911

Washington County utilizes a Citizen Alert System that provides reverse 911 emergency alerts along with other important community messages. These messages are primarily life safety communications such as missing persons, evacuations, and critical information during disasters.

Cell phones are becoming the primary source of communication in many households. While Century Link landline phone accounts are routinely imported into the system, cell numbers are not and need to be registered with the system for alerts.

Signing up for these important notifications can be done at [www.911register.com](http://www.911register.com) or on the [Police Department page](#) of the Town website. Please see the attached flyer from the Police Department for more information.

The system provides notifications to you based on the address registered to the phone number, not the location of the cell phone. During the recent fire, property owners within a certain distance from the fire received notifications while others, who live further from the fire, did not. Additionally, emergency responders also went door to door in the evacuation area to make sure everyone was notified. Emergency responders on scene during an incident determine what areas need to be notified during an emergency.

Once registered, you will receive time-sensitive information using whatever method you specify – home, cell, or business phone, email, text message, hearing impaired receiving devices, or other options.

### Town Website

The Town's website includes an alert system that is used to notify residents and businesses of issues affecting the community, including interruptions to Town utilities, road closures or changes to traffic patterns due to construction activities, and other similar events.



Community members may sign up for [“Notify Me” alerts](#) on the Town’s website and select to receive notifications via email or text message on a variety of subjects, including public meeting agendas, community alerts, and news flash messages.

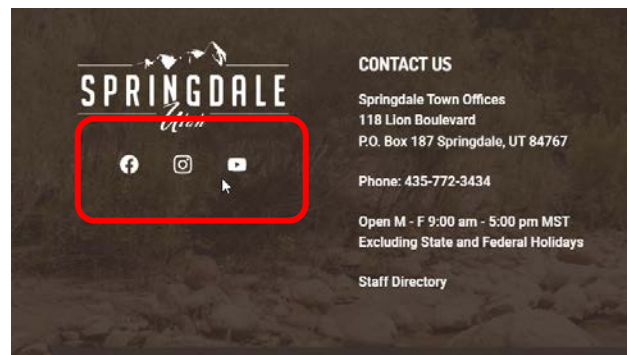

# Reverse 911 Citizen Alert System



## Washington County Citizen Alert

The Washington County Citizen Alert system is a notification service that allows you to receive emergency alerts. You can subscribe to receive notifications based on your location by entering your contact information. The information you provide is protected and will not be used for any other purpose.

### How It Works

When notifications are issued about a potential safety hazard or concern, you will receive a message on the voice or text communication methods that you have registered. If requested for the notification, you can confirm that you have received the message and you will not be contacted by any subsequent methods regarding that particular notification. If you do not confirm, the system will continue to attempt to reach you at all of the contact paths that you have registered.

### Sign up for Notifications

Create an account and add your contact and location information into the Mass Notification system. All information you provide will be kept strictly confidential.

### Stop Receiving Notifications

You can stop receiving at any time by removing your contact information from your profile.
