Why Did They Do That?

A Planning Commissioner suggested that I write a column about why the Planning Commission and Town Council sometimes make decisions that seem "wrong" or are unpopular. I think it's a great idea. Thanks, Paul.

Zoning and land use decisions are either administrative or legislative. Administrative decisions are, in theory, very straightforward. If the applicant meets the requirements of the applicable ordinance, zone, and parameters, the application must be approved. An example of this would be the Design Development Review of the Downtown Plaza that came before the Planning Commission on November 15, 2024. The proposed project complied with all standards of the zone (Public Use Zone), which include setbacks, colors and materials, building size, building height, and landscape. There would be no valid reason to deny the approval of the project, regardless of whether a Planning Commissioner, neighboring property owner, or resident wanted the project to be implemented.

A legislative decision is essentially a policy decision by the local government. These decisions are not bound by specific rules or standards, and the Commission or Council has broad discretionary powers. An example of this would be a request for a zone change such as a request for a Transient Lodging Overlay zone. The Commission and Council use criteria that is subjective. They also refer to the General Plan for guidance. One example is whether, in the opinion of the voting members, the proposed development promotes the Town's "in the Park feel," small village scale, and unique village atmosphere. Denial or approval are both valid outcomes.

Dark Sky Month

"For my part I know nothing with any certainty, but the sight of the stars makes me dream."

The night sky has been a muse for many artists. Van Gogh's famous *Starry Night* in Saint Rémy, France, in 1889, some of Shakespeare's most famous sonnets, Betye Saar's *Celestial Universe* (1988) and William Daman, a 16th-century composer, *Harmony of the Spheres*. The sky is a source of awe and inspiration to many more artists, astrologists, scientists, National Parks, children, you, and Springdale. Unfortunately, the Milky Way is no longer visible in Saint Rémy, France, the location of one of the most famous and recognizable paintings in art history.

For the past 16 years, the Town of Springdale has taken steps to preserve the quality of the dark night skies. Not only to preserve the night skies' beauty but also to preserve the quality of life for local wildlife, ecosystems, human health, energy, and climate.

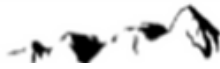
Here are some tips on how you can help preserve the night sky:

1. LEDs and compact fluorescent (CFLs) can help reduce energy use and protect the environment, but only warm-colored bulbs should be used.
2. Dimmers, motion sensors, and timers can help to reduce average illumination levels and save even more energy.
3. Outdoor lighting fixtures that shield the light source to minimize glare and light trespass. (See Town Staff for details on code compliance)
4. Unnecessary indoor lighting - particularly in empty buildings at night - should be turned off. This will help prevent leakage of interior light into the night sky.
5. Take a few moments to inspect your property for inefficient or unnecessary outdoor lighting.

Vincent Van Gogh would not be able to paint *Starry Night* today due to light pollution in Saint Rémy, France. Springdale hopes to preserve the night sky for the present and the future.

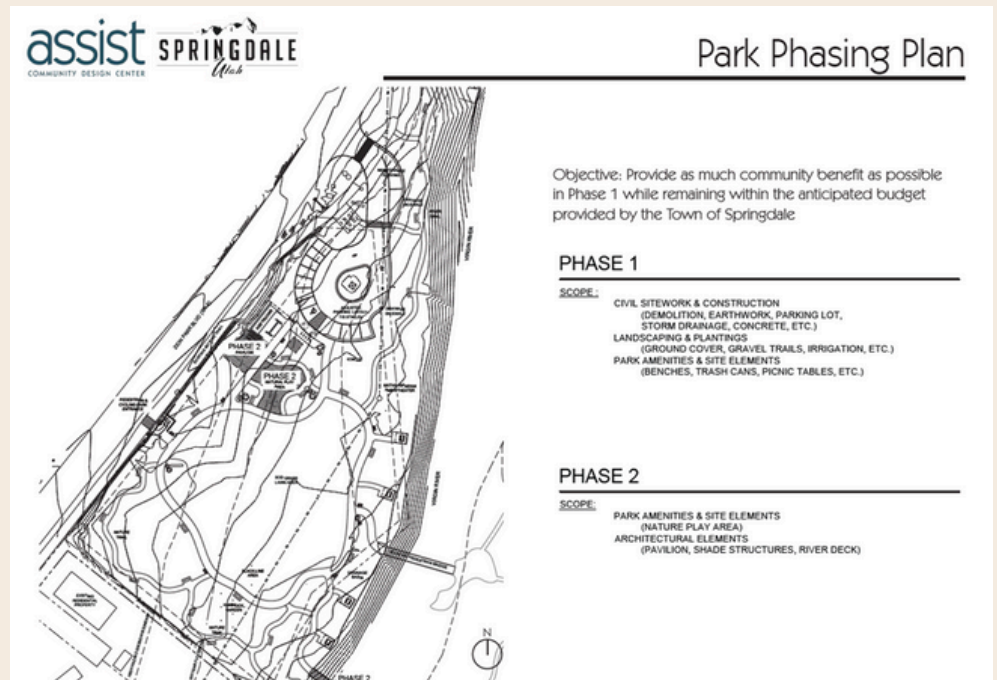


River Park Project Updates

Those of you who attended the Town birthday party and visited the parks and recreation booth may have noticed some updates to the River Park project. In an effort to be cost-conscious and responsive to community needs, the latest plan is to complete the redevelopment in phases. Phase 1 will include opening up the new parcel for patron use, improving the irrigation system, new landscaping improvements, and additional benches, trashcans and picnic tables. Phase 2 will come at a later date once money becomes available.

The completion of this project is funding-dependent, and Town staff have recently applied for grant funding through the State of Utah's Community Parks and Recreation Grant for assistance. We anticipate finding out at the beginning of May if we are awarded, at which point we will apply for additional destination development funding through Washington County.

Springdale: Tree City, USA

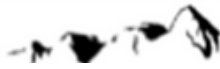
Every April, the Town of Springdale participates in the celebration of Arbor Day. April's Town Council meeting will include an Arbor Day proclamation, showing the Town's commitment to tree health. For the past 16 years, Springdale has been recognized as a "tree city" by the Arbor Day Foundation, but this award is so much more than a sign that you see when you drive into town.

As a tree city, our staff are dedicated to preserving and enhancing our urban canopy for the benefit of the community. How do we do this? Some of things we have accomplished to prioritize our urban forest include:

- Planting of new trees in our parks, open spaces, and rights-of-way
- Care and maintenance of our existing trees with common best-practices
- Creation and adoption of the Springdale Tree Management Plan
- Development of a detailed tree inventory
- Training staff on current trends and industry standards
- Grant funding for the removal of harmful and noxious invasive species
- Yearly community outreach and education with Springdale Elementary School students

While we are proud of the award, we understand that there is much more that can be done. We have some exciting developments coming soon that will help us grow in our purpose to "prioritize and help to ensure the long-term health and sustainability of the local tree population..." We will continue striving to do everything we can to promote tree health in Springdale!





Help is on the Way! More Internet Options Coming to Town

South Central Communications is in the process of installing fiber optic cable throughout the Town. With the completion of this project, every Springdale residence and business will have the option to connect to reliable high speed internet! This project will be a great benefit to the Town by providing more options for internet access.

A large infrastructure project such as this has unavoidable impacts during the construction process. While South Central has tried to minimize disturbance and impacts on residents and businesses as much as possible there have been some unavoidable, and even a few avoidable, disturbances. South Central and the Town both appreciate residents' patience and understanding as this project has proceeded, with its attendant impacts and interruptions.

We anticipate the major construction activities of this project will be complete by mid April. There will be some additional work after that time making the fiber connections to individual properties, but the major work of installing conduit will be complete. Additionally, there will be some ongoing work at South Central's small communications building near the Rocky Mountain power substation (e.g. stuccoing the building to be compliant with Town standards, installing the required fencing to screen the building and associated mechanical equipment, restoring and reclaiming the area used for construction staging, etc.).

As this project approaches its completion the impacts on the community will decrease. In the meantime, if you have concerns about the project or notice something you would like to discuss please contact Town Manager Rick Wixom or Director of Community Development Thomas Dansie at 435-772-3434.

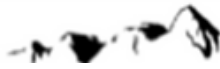

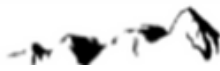
When Planning Commissioners and Council members make decisions, they consider many factors. They are trained not to make decisions based on "public clamor" (defined as a loud or strong demand for something by many people) but instead to make decisions based on the facts and ordinances. In legislative decisions, of course they listen to the desires of residents as presented in a public hearing or in writing prior to the meeting. They do want to know where various groups stand on an issue. In the end, they vote according to what they think is best for the future of Springdale holistically and not based on how any one person or group of people feels about the application.

Commissioners and Council members are always willing to have a conversation about decisions they have made or will be making. Contact information is posted on the Town of Springdale website, and they welcome your input.

Attention Springdale Dog Owners!

It is time to renew your Town of Springdale dog's license/registration. Dog registration and licensing renewals are due by May 1st and delinquent after May 15th.

You can complete your dog licensing in one of two ways:

- In Person: Visit the Town Hall in Springdale. [Download the Dog License Registration/Renewal Application \(PDF\)](#).
- Online: Submit your application or renewal online through the Online Dog License Registration on the Town's website, www.springdaletown.com.

Requirements:

- Proof of a current rabies vaccination is required for registration. If vaccination is needed, please contact one of the local veterinary clinics for an appointment (<https://zionvet.com/>; <https://desertvethurricane.com/>).

Fees:

- \$5 for a spayed or neutered dog
- \$40 for a non-spayed or non-neutered (functioning) dog

Stay compliant and keep your pets safe—register your dogs before the deadline!

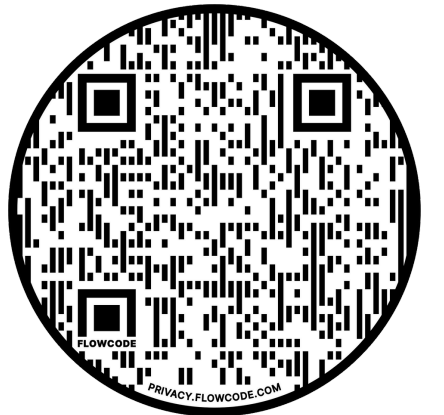

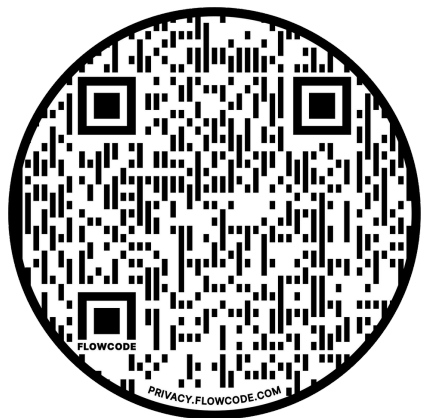
